District Population: 37,000

Location: Suburban community near both air and seaports. Center of government, business, education, and cultural facilities.

Student body: 60% from Central Maui, 40% from surrounding areas

School

Maui High School is located in Kahului and serves the central and southeastern districts on the island, including Kihei, Wailea, and Makena. The populations of these districts are entirely dissimilar. The central district is a long, established working class suburban community of residences, small business, and light industry. The southeastern district is a generally transient and newly built community surrounded by large resorts and hotels. The ethnically diverse student population includes Filipinos (50%), Caucasians (10%), Japanese (5%), Hawaiians (2%), African Americans, Chinese, Hispanics, Koreans, Portuguese, Samoans, Tongans, Marshallese, Micronesians, as well as other non-disclosed ethnicities. Maui High School was founded in 1913 and is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. It is one of eight public high schools in the tri-isle Maui District.

Schedule and Accreditation

MHS has a seven-period revolving schedule where periods run from 55 to 60 minutes. Freshman and sophomores are grouped into smaller learning communities called "Academies". Juniors and seniors select career pathways. MHS is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The entire K-12 state education system follows a uniform school calendar. This year, classes began on August 7 and will end on May 31. Fall recess is from October 9 - 13, winter break from December 22 - January 7, and spring break from March 19 - 23. Graduation date is May 26, 2017.
