History of the SIG

Founded in 2018, the year after Boston NACAC by a group of counselors touring schools that specialize in serving students with learning disabilities/ differences (Dean, Landmark, Curry).

Founder was Dr. Jill Corbin, I jumped along for the ride (and was in the conversations on the tour!)

Initially, the focus of the group was learning differences/ disabilities.

Discussion over the years spawned a desire to be more broadly inclusive.

With new leadership in 2024, through collaboration and discussion, a new mission, vision, and title of the SIG was established, along with sub groups.

SLD in educational settings

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Sec. 300.8 (c) (10)

Specific learning disability

- •(i) General. Specific learning disability means a disorder in one or more of the basic psychological processes involved in understanding or in using language, spoken or written, that may manifest itself in the imperfect ability to listen, think, speak, read, write, spell, or to do mathematical calculations, including conditions such as perceptual disabilities, brain injury, minimal brain dysfunction, dyslexia, and developmental aphasia.
- •(ii) Disorders not included. Specific learning disability does not include learning problems that are primarily the result of visual, hearing, or motor disabilities, of intellectual disability, of emotional disturbance, or of environmental, cultural, or economic disadvantage.

| Specific Learning Disorder (SLD) | Specific Learning Disability (SLD) |
|--|--|
| Medical term used for a clinical diagnosis. | Educational and legal term used in schools and legal systems. |
| Defined in the DSM-5 (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders). | Defined under IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) |
| Diagnosis made by clinicians , such as psychologists, pediatricians, neurologists based on specific criteria. | Identification made by educators and school teams for special education services and accommodations. |
| Used to describe neurological-based difficulties in reading, writing, or math. | Used to determine eligibility for services under U.S. special education law |
| Can qualify an individual for a learning disability classification in the educational system. | Someone with a diagnosis of specific learning disorder typically qualifies for learning disability status in school. |
| Not a legally recognized disability on its own but can contribute to eligibility. | Recognized as a federally protected disability , granting access to accommodations and services. |
